

SPECIALTY SHOW GUIDELINES

NOTE: In this document, capitalized "Dog" will refer to competing males, "Bitch" will refer to competing females, and "Dog/s", "dog/s", "dog" or "dogs" will refer to dogs in general and no specific gender.



SPECIALTY: An ISSDC Specialty Show is a Shiloh-only event, which includes Regular Classes in conformation as well as Special Classes as defined by the ISSDC BOD. The top award in the Regular Classes at an ISSDC Specialty is Best of Breed. Awards are also given in the Special Classes sponsored in the event.

REGULAR CLASSES: Dog/s must be intact (not spayed or neutered) in order to compete in the Regular Classes of the conformation show. Points toward Breed Championships, Grand Victor (GV) awards, National Select (NS) awards, and Puppy of The Year (POTY) awards may be earned in Regular Classes.

Note: a dog's date of birth (and, therefore, age) will be defined as the date appointed by the breeder on litter registration

- 2-6 Month Baby Puppy Dog/s must be at least 2 months old but less than 6 months old on the date of the show. Dog/s in this class may compete for Puppy of the Year (POTY) awards, but cannot earn points toward their Breed Championship or toward GV/NS awards. Dog/s in this class will not compete against dog/s in any other class. Owners must weigh any health risks of showing a puppy that may not yet be fully immunized for themselves.
- 6-9 Month Junior Puppy Dog/s must be at least 6 months old but less than 9 months old on the date of the show. Dog/s in this class may compete for Junior Puppy awards as well as adult awards in the regular conformation show and can earn points toward both POTY and GV/NS.
- 9-12 Month Junior Puppy Dog/s must be at least 9 months old but less than 12 months old on the date of the show. Dog/s in this class may compete for Junior Puppy awards as well as adult awards in the regular conformation show and can earn points toward both POTY and GV/NS.
- 12-18 Months Dog/s must be at least 12 months old but less than 18 months old on the date of the show.
- Novice Dog/s that are at least 6 months of age and over, who have not, prior to the date of
 closing of entries, earned any points toward their ISSDC Breed Championship. Dog/s under 12 months
 old which are entered in this class will not be included in the Junior Puppy awards competition.
- Bred by Exhibitor The handler of the dog is also its breeder. Breeder does not include stud owner.
 Dog/s under 12 months old which are entered in this class will not be included in the Junior Puppy awards competition.
- **Open** Dog/s at least 6 months of age that are not ISSDC Breed Champions. Dog/s under 12 months old which are entered in this class will not be included in the Junior Puppy awards competition.
- **Breed Champions** Dog/s that have ISSDC Breed Championships. Dog/s with Breed Championships from a Shiloh registry may also show as a Champion, but may need additional points to obtain their ISSDC Championship and be eligible for ISSDC awards. Dog/s under 12 months old which are entered in this class will not be included in the Junior Puppy awards competition.

SPECIAL CLASSES: No points toward Breed Championships or any other awards are earned in these shows. Winners do not move forward into the Breed competition. Intact dog/s competing in the Special Classes may also be entered in the Regular Classes with a separate entry.

- **Junior Handler** Person under 18 years of age and capable of controlling the dog in the show ring. In this class, the person's knowledge and ability to show the dog is judged, and not the dog itself. The dog shown in this class may be altered or intact.
- **Veteran** Dog/s intact AND 7 years of age or older on the date of the show who are either Breed Champions or who have earned points toward their Breed Championship.
- **Companion** Dog/s which have been altered (spayed or neutered). This is a single specialty class. The order of contestants will be called in standard conformation catalog order: specials (champions) and followed by non-championed dogs. No professional handlers are permitted.
- Progeny Dog/s (sire or dam) are shown with at least two of their first generation progeny. Dog/s may be
 altered or intact. In this class, the sire and dam of each litter represented must both have a Shiloh
 Shepherd registry breeding certificate. They will be judged based on the quality and consistency of their
 progeny.

note: The order of the special classes may be changed at the discretion of the ring steward.

SHOW PROCESS AND FLOW:

The ring steward(s) are responsible for the order and flow of the show. The ring steward will announce the start time, usually 10-15 minutes prior to the start of the show, so that handlers can prepare their dogs. Before the show begins, the steward will discuss the Show Tally Sheet with the judge. The Tally Sheet lists all the dogs registered for each class and must be updated after each competition with the winning results. Some judges like to mark the sheet themselves, while others prefer the steward to keep track of which dogs earn ribbons.

When the judge is ready for dogs to enter the ring, the ring steward will notify the judge of how many dogs are registered in that particular class and will then call out the class, gender, and armband number of each dog competing. For example: "Open males, numbers 101, 105, and 113." Handlers and dogs are NOT to be identified by name. It is the steward's responsibility to ensure all dogs enter the ring, are lined up numerically, and that the armband numbers match the Tally Sheet list. Unless otherwise directed by the judge, the dogs and handlers are to line up in ascending catalog order. A request must be made for any individual deviations and they must be approved by the judge. If a dog is missing, the steward will cross that dog off on the Tally Sheet and alert the judge to the change. A dog's armband number will be called three times. If the dog and handler do not appear after three calls, they will be crossed off the Tally Sheet. After the dogs for the current class have been called, the ring steward has the option of calling out the class, gender, and armband numbers for the next class to be judged to assemble "on deck," i.e. close to the ring in order to be ready for the next class, but not so close as to cause a disturbance to the class currently being judged.

When the judge makes the final decision on which dogs win in a class, the steward should have the trophies/ribbons/rosettes on hand. The steward passes the first place item to the judge, who will present it to the first place winner. Then the judge will return for the second item to present, then the third and the fourth. *Each* exhibitor should present their armband number to the steward to record their win prior to exiting the ring.

All Dog classes compete first, followed by the Bitch classes, except for 3-6 month puppies.

SHOW ORDER OF REGULAR CLASSES:

- 2-6 Month Baby Puppy Males <u>Best Baby Puppy Male</u> and <u>1st through 4th places</u> are awarded.
- 2-6 Month Baby Puppy Females <u>Best Baby Puppy Female</u> and <u>1st through 4th places</u> are awarded.
- **Best Baby Puppy** Best Baby Puppy Male & Best Baby Puppy Female compete. <u>Best Baby Puppy</u> is awarded.
- 6-9 Month Junior Puppy Males 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- 9-12 Month Junior Puppy Males 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- 12-18 Month Males 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- Novice Males 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- Bred by Exhibitor Males 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- Open Males 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- Winners Dog The 1st place winner of each male class 6 months and above competes. The classes are called into the ring in reverse order to which they were shown. Winners Dog is awarded, then the second place dog from the class the Winners Dog was in is called into the ring and Reserve Winners Dog is awarded. If Winners Dog is awarded to a Dog from either the 6-9 month or 9-12 month class, then that Dog will automatically earn the Best Junior Puppy Male award and there will be no competition for that award after the Best of Breed class.
- 6-9 Month Junior Puppy Females 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- 9-12 Month Junior Puppy Females 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- 12-18 Month Females 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- Novice Females <u>1st through 4th places</u> are awarded.
- Bred by Exhibitor Females 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- Open Females 1st through 4th places are awarded.
- Winners Bitch The 1st place winner of each female class competes. The classes are called into the ring in reverse order to which they were shown. Winners Bitch is awarded, then the second place female from the class the Winners Bitch was in is called into the ring and Reserve Winners Bitch is awarded. If Winners Bitch is awarded to a Bitch from either the 6-9 month or 9-12 month class, then that Bitch will automatically earn the Best Junior Puppy Female award and there will be no competition for that award after the Best of Breed class.

Breed Champions - Unless the judge asks for a different line-up, the ring steward will call all Breed

Champion males in numerical order, then the females, then the Winners Dog and the Winners Bitch. As there are often many dogs in the Best of Breed ring, the steward will assist the judge in keeping everyone properly lined up and accounted for. In order to make more room in the ring, the judge may decide to split the ring and ask some of the dogs to leave while other dogs are being assessed. The exhibitors leaving the ring should stay close and listen for the judge's next instructions. After all dogs have been judged, Best of Breed (BOB), Best of Opposite Sex (BOS), and Best of Winners (BOW) are awarded. Best of Winners can only be awarded if both a Winners Dog and Winners Bitch are competing. The Best of Winners can also be Best of Breed or Best Opposite Sex. If Best of Winners is awarded to a Dog/Bitch from either the 6-9 month or 9-12 month class, then that Dog/Bitch will automatically earn the Best Junior Puppy award and there will be no competition for that award after the Best of Breed class. Breed Select(s) may also be awarded at the judge's discretion.

- Breed Select Awards: Breed Select awards may be given at the judge's discretion in order to
 recognize excellence in particular dog/s in addition to the Best of Breed, Best of Opposite, and
 Best of Winners. For every ten ISSDC Champions showing, two Breed Selects may be awarded.
 For every five dogs, or fraction thereof, in excess of 10, one additional Breed Select may be
 awarded. No points of any kind shall be awarded to Breed Select winners.
- **Best Junior Puppy Male** 1st place 6-9 month male and 1st place 9-12 month male compete. Best Junior Puppy Male is awarded.
- **Best Junior Puppy Female** 1st place 6-9 month female and 1st place 9-12 month female compete. <u>Best Junior Puppy Female</u> is awarded.
- **Best Junior Puppy –** Best Junior Puppy Male & Best Junior Puppy Female compete. <u>Best Junior</u> Puppy is awarded.

SHOW ORDER OF SPECIAL CLASSES:

- **Junior Handler** All junior handlers show together. <u>Best Junior Handler</u> and <u>Reserve Junior Handler</u> are awarded.
- **Veteran** All veteran males and females compete together. <u>Best Veteran</u> and <u>Best of Opposite Sex</u> Veteran are awarded.
- **Companion** All companion males and females compete together. <u>Best Companion</u> and <u>Best of</u> Opposite Sex Companion are awarded.
- **Sire Progeny** All sires are shown with at least two of their first generation progeny. <u>Progeny Best Sire</u> is awarded.
- **Dam Progeny** All dams are shown with at least two of their first generation progeny. <u>Progeny Best Dam</u> is awarded.
- **Best Progeny** The Progeny Best Sire & his progeny and Progeny Best Dam & her progeny compete. Best Progeny is awarded.

note: The order of the special classes may be changed at the discretion of the ring steward.

JUDGING STANDARDS: Each dog is assessed according to the ISSDC Shiloh breed standard *as the judge understands and interprets it.* Judging can be quite subjective, as one judge may be partial to dogs with small ears and proper tail set, while another judge may prefer tall dogs with great movement. The judge evaluates each dog on four factors which are outlined in the breed standard:

- 1. Conformation the dog's body structure, how it is "put together"
- 2. Physical Characteristics e.g. ear shape and height, tail carriage, skin pigment, eye shape, plus many others
- 3. Temperament the dog's personality and attitude
- 4. Movement the dog's gait and foot placement when it trots

Note: In the event a venue appoints a panel of judges for a show, the panel shall be considered one entity (i.e. one judge) for that show and not separate judges.

Note: Any dog whose physical appearance has been affected by surgery as a result of a medical necessity must be accompanied by a letter from the veterinarian who performed the procedure with a clear explanation of the repair and why it was required. A copy of this letter must be presented to the Ring Steward before the judging begins. The Ring Steward will keep the letter available for the judge's reference if there is a question; however, do not call it to judge's attention prior to judging.

VISITORS: The ISSDC is delighted to welcome visitors to the show. Well-behaved dogs are also welcome on a leash no longer than 6 feet. Retractable leads are not allowed. Visiting dogs must maintain a distance of 20 feet from the show rings and steward's table so as not to impede handlers and dogs moving to and from the rings. Dogs must be under control by their owners at all times. If loud or aggressive, you may be asked to leave the show grounds.

SHILOH SHEPHERD BREED STANDARD

The official Shiloh Shepherd Breed Standard of the International Shiloh Shepherd Dog Club, Inc. (ISSDC, Inc.)
This breed standard may be used by all interested parties in its entirety and without alteration.



Brief Historical Summary:

In the 1980's, a German Shepherd breeder from western New York state began to visualize a specific type of shepherd dog; one that was larger, calmly tempered and possessed better hips than the norm. Through breeding a specific type, introducing a northern breed to the gene pool, and educating the public on the benefits of x-raying hips, the Shiloh Shepherd was "born" and formally recognized as a breed of dog by FIC in 1990 and ARBA in 1991.

General Appearance:

The Shiloh Shepherd is large, strong and muscular, with noble expression. He is powerful, elegant and athletic; distinguished by a balanced build and possessing a confident calmness.

Important Proportions:

Height at withers to length of body: 8.5 to 10. The depth of chest is 50% of the height at withers.

Behavior/Temperament:

Of flock guardian descent, the Shiloh Shepherd is bred to be the ultimate companion dog. The Shiloh Shepherd is courageous, and self confident with an almost supernatural intelligence. It is an extremely versatile breed that should always be willing to work and play. They are calm, sweet and loving with children, elderly people and small animals, yet bold and brave enough to protect them from harms way.

The following are particular requirements of steady temperament:

- Self assurance and superior composure
- Willing to be submissive; adaptive to surroundings
- Good capacity to observe, learn and remember
- Inquisitive to noise without showing apprehension
- Friendly and amiable yet perceptive to menacing situations

FAULT

 Spooking at strange sights or sounds along with tucking of tail is considered a very serious fault

Cranial Region:

SKULL: In profile and viewed from the front, slightly domed. Width and length should appear to be equal

STOP: Clearly recognizable, gently defined, with slight center furrow

Head & Facial Region: The head is to be wedge shaped, large, yet in proportion to the body. It is dry in its general appearance, and moderately broad between the ears, never clumsy or overly long. Secondary sexual characteristics should be evident.

NOSE: Black, set level with the muzzle, blunt rather than pointy.

MUZZLE: Smoothly set into the skull, never running to a point; nasal bridge is level and parallels the topline of the skull. Breadth is nearly even. Fur predominantly black in color LIPS: Close fitting, black, corners of lips closed.

JAWS: Strong, well developed. Lower jaw is visible from the front and profile when mouth is closed.

TEETH: 42 total, 20 upper and 22 lower. Scissor bite with dentition aligned properly and enamel healthy.

CHEEKS: Only slightly developed.

EYES: All shades of brown accepted. Medium sized, almond shaped, obliquely set. Eye rims are black. Expression is of the utmost importance and should be keen, soulful, and reciprocative.

EARS: Erect, stiff, moderately pointed, triangular in shape. Well cupped, thick leathers that open toward the front. Height should be equal to width at base. Base of ears should set above the eyes.

FAULTS

- A long, narrow or snipey muzzle
- Weak under jaw
- *SERIOUS-Ears that are out of proportion; too large and/or tall
- *SERIOUS-Ears that are low set; over set; or show signs of weakness
- *DISQUALIFYING-Ears that hang on an adult (over 15 months old)
- *DISQUALIFYING-Overshot bite, undershot bite; wry mouth

Neck: Proportioned to head and body. Slightly arched without break to the withers. Pleasingly long and muscular rather than stocky, without throatiness or dewlap.

Body:

WITHERS: Well defined, smoothly set into neck and back.

BACK: Firm, straight, broad. Length derived from well laid shoulder and correct croup length.

LOINS: Viewed from the top; broad, strong, well muscled without undue length.

CROUP: Broad, relatively long, gently rounded with ideal angle of 30-35 degrees.

CHEST: Broad, deep; reaching at least to the level of the elbows, carried well forward.

RIBS: Well sprung, relatively long, allowing unrestricted elbow movement.

ABDOMEN: Firmly held, slightly tucked.

TAIL: Set well into the croup. Extends at least to the hock joint. Full and bushy, especially on underside. Hangs like a saber when relaxed; is lifted more in excitement, and may rise above the horizontal plane of topline in high excitement if tail remains straight and the tip does not pass the vertical line of the croup.

TOPLINE: A smooth gradual slope from the head; to nearly level back; to tip of tail. The head, neck, wither, back, croup, and tail are distinctly and harmoniously represented. TESTICLES: Males should have two apparently normal testicles fully descended into the scrotum.

FAULTS

- Any deviation from the proper topline when standing (sway, roach, low-stationed)
- Undue length between last rib and thigh
- Slab-sided or barrel shaped ribbing
- *SERIOUS-Hook, ring or gay tail. Short, thin or ratty tail
- *DISQUALIFYING-Tail that curls forward past the vertical line of the croup
- *DISQUALIFYING-male dog with absent testicle(s)

Forequarters:

FORELEGS: Heavy boned; straight; parallel and not too close, dew-claws are present SHOULDER/UPPER ARM: Near to equal in length, well muscled, ideal angle being 110 degree; scapula are long, obliquely set, laid back at about 30 degrees

ELBOWS: Close to the body, never pinched or turned out

PASTERN: Strong, firm; straight when seen from the front, approximate 25 degree angle

from side

FORE FEET: Straight, rounded, compact; toes well arched; pads are thick and black

Hindquarters: Broad and well muscled

HIND LEGS: Not too close when viewed from the rear. Parallel to each other. Dew-claws are absent

HOCKS: Sturdily built, firm, turned neither in nor out

PELVIS: Slanting at an ideal 30-35 degree angle from the horizontal

THIGH: Rather long, full, strongly muscled. When stacked, femur and metatarsus are

vertical; pelvis and lower leg are parallel

HIND FEET: Straight, toes arched, tight; pads are thick and black

Gait/Movement:

The gait is considered a critical aspect of the breed. The Shiloh Shepherd is built for a ground-covering, extended, suspended trot. The limbs must be harmonious in length and angulation thereby creating a firm and level back. The hindquarters should push the torso forward in such a manner that the rear stride perfectly matches that of the forequarters. The feet should remain close to the ground; single tracking is evident. With the head thrust forward and the tail slightly lifted, the impression is level, balanced, animated, and uninterrupted; a gently flowing overline from the tips of the ears over the nape and back, through to the end of the tail.

Form follows function to produce balance, strength, coordination, and endurance to allow for many hours of play, service, or work.

The Shiloh Shepherd must be observed on a loose lead so the natural gait is evident.

FAULTS

- A back that does not remain firm but displays a roll, whip, roach or sway
- *SERIOUS-any faults of gait/structure whether from front, rear or side

Coat: Shiloh Shepherds should be shown in their natural state. Trimming is only required between the pads and toes and the excessive "tufts" of hair inside and around the ears.

There are two acceptable coat varieties, smooth and plush. In both varieties, the length should be shorter along the sides of the body, forelegs, foreface, and feet; with the length of the coat increasing around the shoulders and neck, down the back, over the croup and in the breeches and underside of the tail.

SMOOTH COAT: A thick, coarse, harsh double coat. The outer coat should be straight and dense and lie reasonably close to the body. The undercoat is dense, from 1 to 2 inches in depth. The back of the forelegs and hind legs has somewhat longer hair.

PLUSH COAT: The plush coat may lack coarseness while still remaining somewhat harsh. It should have a softer undercoat, longer mane and chest hairs, and more pronounced feathering around head, underline, back of legs and tail. Overall length of coat should not exceed 3" in torso area, 6" on legs.

FAULTS

Any coat that is open, wooly, curly, too close or too long

Color: Dual colored coats should always be black in the saddle/blanket. Black with shades of tan, golden tan, reddish tan, silver, beige, and cream are as desirable as various shades of richly pigmented golden, red, dark brown, or dark grey. Sables are equally acceptable in the same colors with guard hairs tipped in black and a lighter undercoat, usually fawn or grey. Shiloh Shepherds can also be solid black or solid white.

A small white patch on the chest and white hairs on the toes are tolerated. Pads, toenails, lips, nose and eye rims should be black. Lighter and darker facial masks and eye spectacles are acceptable and desirable.

FAULTS

- White spotting with exception of chest (no bigger than palm of an adult hand) and feet (allowed on toes only)
- Washed out or pale colors, blues, livers; any lack of proper pigment

Height & Weight:

Structural perfection should never be sacrificed for height. Dogs should be evaluated for this parameter at maturity (36 months of age).

DOGS: Height 28 - 32 inches BITCHES: Height 26 - 30 inches

Weight of a Shiloh Shepherd is what represents optimal condition for the individual dog/bitch.

FAULT

 *DISQUALIFYING - Dogs/bitches that do not meet minimum height requirements by 36 months of age

Faults: Any departure from the foregoing points should be considered a fault, and the seriousness with which the fault should be regarded should be in exact proportion to its degree.

Scale of Points for Judging the Shiloh Shepherd (100 point total)

Gait, Movement	25 points
General Appearance: strength, size, balance	15 points
Head and Ears	15 points
Topline, Tail, Hindquarters	15 points
Forequarters	10 points
Proportions, body, chest, ribbing, abdomen	10 points
Character: alertness and attitude	5 points
Color, Coat	5 points
total	100 points

Official Universal Winsheet Instructions

Page 2 of Winsheet Form

SECTION 1: About Your Dog: This section requires pertinent information on the dog and owner. Please complete this section in full on every win sheet you submit.

SECTION 2: Class Entered THIS Show: When entering this dog show you will have chosen a "Class" for your dog to be shown in. Please check the appropriate class associated with this show from this list. If "Other", please describe

Also enter the "Armband Number" you were given to wear when showing this dog.

SECTION 3: Number of Shilohs in this Show: Enter the number of male Shilohs (Class and Champion) and the number of female Shilohs (Class and Champion) regardless of their registry. Include your own dog in the count. ONLY count Shilohs which are **6 months old or older** on the day of the show. DO NOT count any Shiloh which has been disqualified from the show by the judge. If showing with **IABCA**, ONLY count Shilohs which are **12 months old or older** the day of the show, unless the judge agrees to do additional judging for the Shilohs.*

*IABCA shows have a very different format than most other show organizations. They do not show dogs under 12 months against dogs over 12 months and the only award that they give, per breed, is Best of Breed. The judge must judge the Shilohs based on the IABCA format first. BUT, someone associated with the Shilohs may approach the judge before the Shilohs enter the ring, and ask the judge if they will also judge the Shilohs as per the standard show format so that the Shilohs can earn points for their club and registry awards. Meaning that all dogs 6 months of age and over will be shown together, and that a Winners Dog, Winners Bitch, Best of Winners, and Best of Opposite Sex will be chosen in addition to Best of Breed. Note: A different Best of Breed than was chosen for the IABCA judging may be chosen during this additional judging. This is the Shiloh that will get the Best of Breed points for their club and registry. The judge may also be asked to choose a Best of Breed Puppy (3-6 months) and Best of Breed Junior (6-12 months). The judge may choose to do this additional judging in whatever manner they prefer, based on the Shilohs showing. Be prepared to tell them how many class Shilohs of each sex and how many champion Shilohs of each sex are entered in that show. The numbers will be different than the IABCA numbers because for the additional judging, you will only count the Shilohs which have club championships as champions. This will allow the Shilohs to earn additional championship points towards their club and breed championships. IABCA's Bred By wins do not count for points, as they are an additional show within the main show. Only one Shiloh may receive points for Best of Breed per show.

SECTION 4: Awards for THIS Show Only: Check every award that your dog won in this show. **If your win is NOT listed, NO WINSHEET IS NEEDED.** Don't forget, this Winsheet is for "**ONE SHOW ONLY**". Do NOT check everything your dog won over the course of many shows on one single Winsheet.

SPECIAL NOTE: Be sure to review the most current point tabulation rules for your registry and the ISSDC annually. All ISSDC GV and NS candidates must be a finished ISSDC Champion of Record and have hip testing (either preliminary or final) completed by December 31st of the point year to be eligible for these awards.
